

Scripture Reading: Isaiah 6:1-8

Do your best and let God do the rest!



Today is Trinity Sunday. When I was growing up, we always sang Reginald Heber's classic hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty." It was the first hymn in our hymnal—like it was the most important.

The doctrine of the Trinity *is* important, but often we have trouble explaining why. And even more troubling is the thought that *perhaps we don't care and don't know why we should*.

Yes, we should care, and I am going to tell you why. And I will say up front that some of my arguments will be pretty weak. But there's one good one, I think.

- 1. We should care because *believing in the Trinity is part of our confession as Christians*. It is an article of faith. We're Christians and we have believed in a Trinitarian God since the patristic era of the church. So, we embrace it. We own it. We're Trinitarians.
- 2. We should care because there *is biblical support for the doctrine of the Trinity*. I am not going to cite references here, because I don't have the space. Trust me.
- 3. We should care because there are *many nifty metaphors to help us understand the Trinity*. I didn't say that they explained the Trinity *perfectly*, but they hint as to the *reasonableness* of the concept. These metaphors include the three-leaf clover, the triangle, water (can exist as gas, ice or liquid), an egg (shell, yolk and albumen), and others.
- 4. Here's the strongest argument: We should care because a Trinitarian model of the Godhead helps us *to know, understand and love God*. I prefer to use the example (remember, examples are seldom *perfect*) of a woman who is at the same time a daughter, a mother and (often) a wife. She is *herself* in her essential nature, but she has three different modalities. And if I wish to know her, the more I interact with her in her different modes, the closer I might become to her. See what I mean?

Understanding the Trinity helps me to know the fullness of the nature of God. And this is huge if I want to walk faithfully and in fellowship with God, especially in challenging times such as these.
