

Scripture Reading: Ephesians 3:14-21

*I always thought love was shaped like a heart,
but it's actually shaped like a cross. —Anon.*

Let's read verses 18 and 19 of today's Bible passage: *I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.*

Notice the apostle Paul's reference to the shape and size of Christ's love for us. He mentions the *width* and *length* of the love of Christ, along with its *height* and *depth* (one and the same; the height is the same as the depth).

Clearly, Paul is searching for a three-dimensional metaphor to illustrate the vastness of the love of Christ.

There are many possible geometric shapes he could've mentioned. Triangles (scalene, isosceles, equilateral, acute-angled, obtuse-angled, right-angled; four-sided shapes such as a square, rectangle, parallelogram, rhombus, trapezium or kite; or a circle, sphere, cone or cylinder. Or course there are many more geometric shapes.

But which one does justice to the "shape" or "size" of the love of Christ?

None of them! The love of Christ "surpasses" human knowledge. Yet Paul prays that we might "know" what "surpasses knowledge."

How can you know what is unknowable?

He means that it is possible to *experience* what is *unknowable and unexplainable*.

We experience many things that we cannot explain and which is beyond our particular ability to understand — things like electricity, computers, airplanes, smartphones and so on. *Some* people obviously have this knowledge, but perhaps not most of us.

In the same way, we might not know, understand or explain the love of Christ, but we know it is real because we have experienced it!

Let us be thankful for the love of Christ!
